## Public Health Officer Update

## COVID-19

- We currently have a Flirt mutation of Covid-19. It's called "Flirt" because it's a specific designated area with a spiked protein.
- There is no increase in hospitalizations or deaths.
- Anticipate another vaccine for Fall 2024.

## Avian Influenza (HPAI / H5N1)

- Bird flu (H5N1), a <u>novel influenza virus.</u> Like the coronavirus, the bird flu can potentially create a pandemic hitting the general population, mostly effecting the immunosuppressed or elderly.
- H5N1 has been found in birds and wildfowl, killing 98 million fowl.
- It is highly pathogenic in birds and has recently been found in dairy cows.
- 9 states with over 58 herds where the H5N1 influenza virus has been found, including in the milk **none** in **California** so far.
- 2 potential candidates for the influenza vaccines covering Avian Influenza.
- Drinking raw milk puts you at a higher risk of getting H5N1.

## Black Maternal Health

- Maternal health immortality in the United States: 700 900 women experience death related to pregnancy or childbirth.
- Every case of mortality is approximately 70 to 80 cases of severe morbidity (severe complications).
- 50,000 women in the U.S. experience near-fatal complications.
- 60% of deaths have been found preventable.
- California San Bernardino County: mortality ratio per 100,000 is 18.6% (state level).
- Racial disparities are seen in pregnancy-related mortality.
- An individual's overall health considers <u>50%</u> of their fiscal environment and socioeconomic factors (education, job status, family support, income, community safety, and physical environment), <u>30%</u> of health behaviors (alcohol consumption, tobacco use, diet & exercise), and 20% is clinic assistance (access to care).

- Chronic toxic stress is the result of structural racism which leads to poor maternal health outcomes in black women, known as <u>Weathering.</u>
- If you're having any red flag symptoms while you're pregnant or during post-partum like a headache that won't go away, trouble breathing, decreased fetal movement, feeling really tired, or feeling like something's just not right Please speak up.

## Black Infant Health

- California Health Collaborative 75 regional statewide programs throughout California (tobacco prevention, nutrition, diabetes prevention).
- Black Infant Health (BIH) services are provided in California communities where 90% of black births occur: San Bernardino, High Desert, Riverside, San Diego, Los Angeles, and Long Beach (14 counties, 22 cities).
- BIH focuses on <u>contributing factors</u> of racial inequities and disempowered communities: chronic stress, social isolation, limited access to services, and economic hardship.
  - Racial Inequities Racism is declared a public health crisis.
- Program Model:
  - Support social support and reduce isolation.
  - Provide health education on stress management techniques to reduce stress.
  - Refer women to appropriate medical/social/economic/and mental health services
  - Partner with the community and providers to educate.
- There are 2 sites in San Bernardino County with a variety of programs: 10-week support groups that cover topics such as health, nutrition, exercise, breastfeeding, relationships, parenting techniques, and life planning case management.
- Prenatal and postpartum groups for any black woman who has just given birth from 0-5 months.
- Women's Health Expo there were over 500 people at that event to engage with the community, provide different tables talking about different things: maternal stressors, breastfeeding, and exercising.
