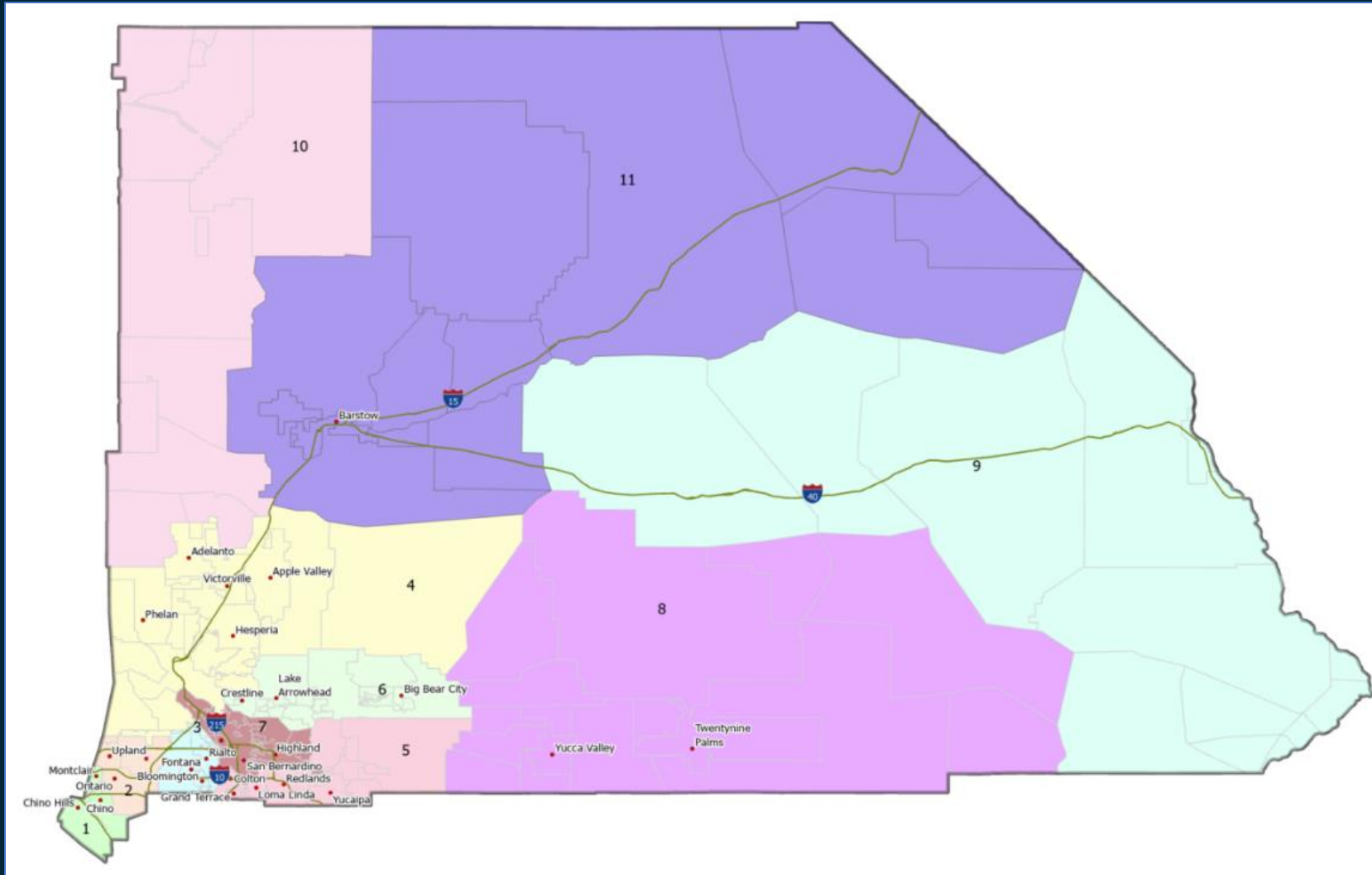

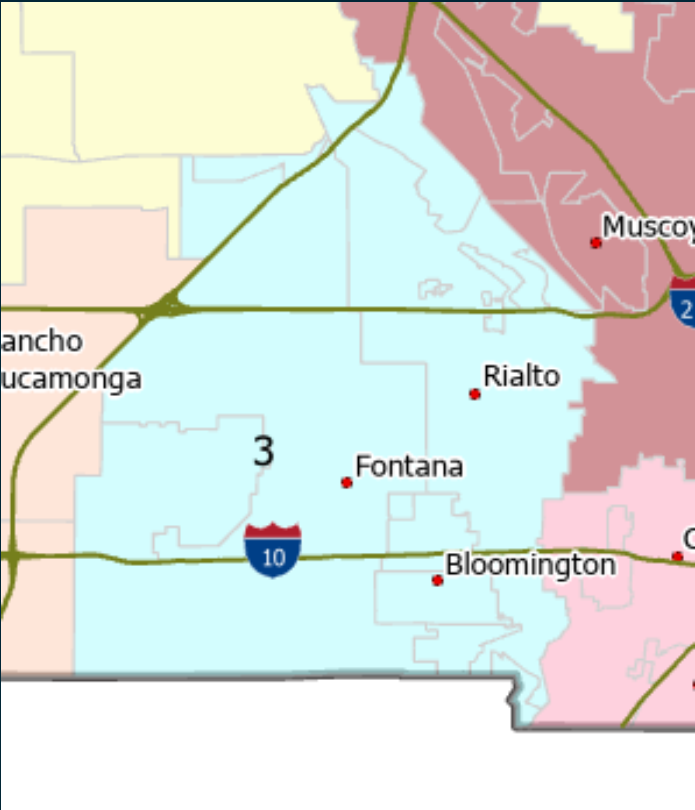

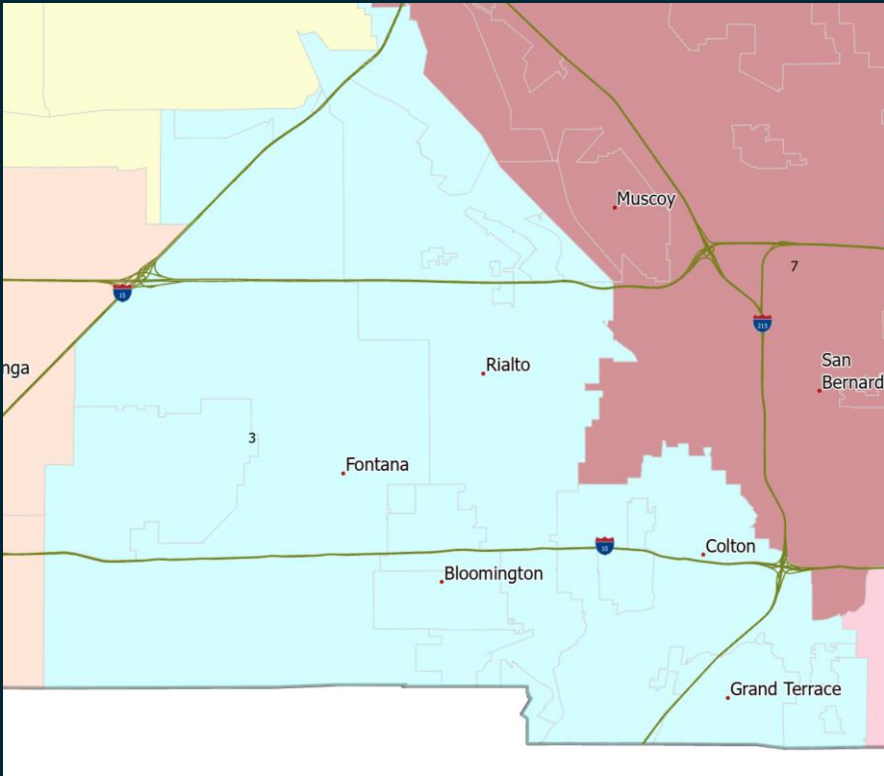

Add Grand Terrace and Colton to Zone 3



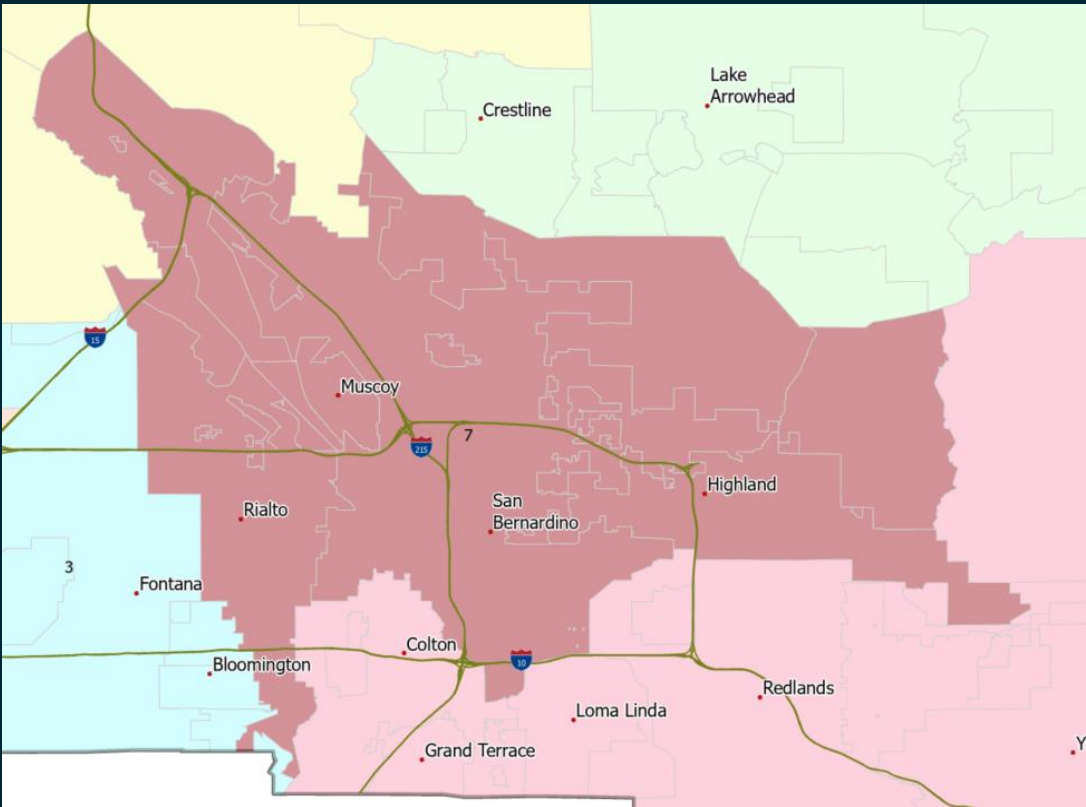
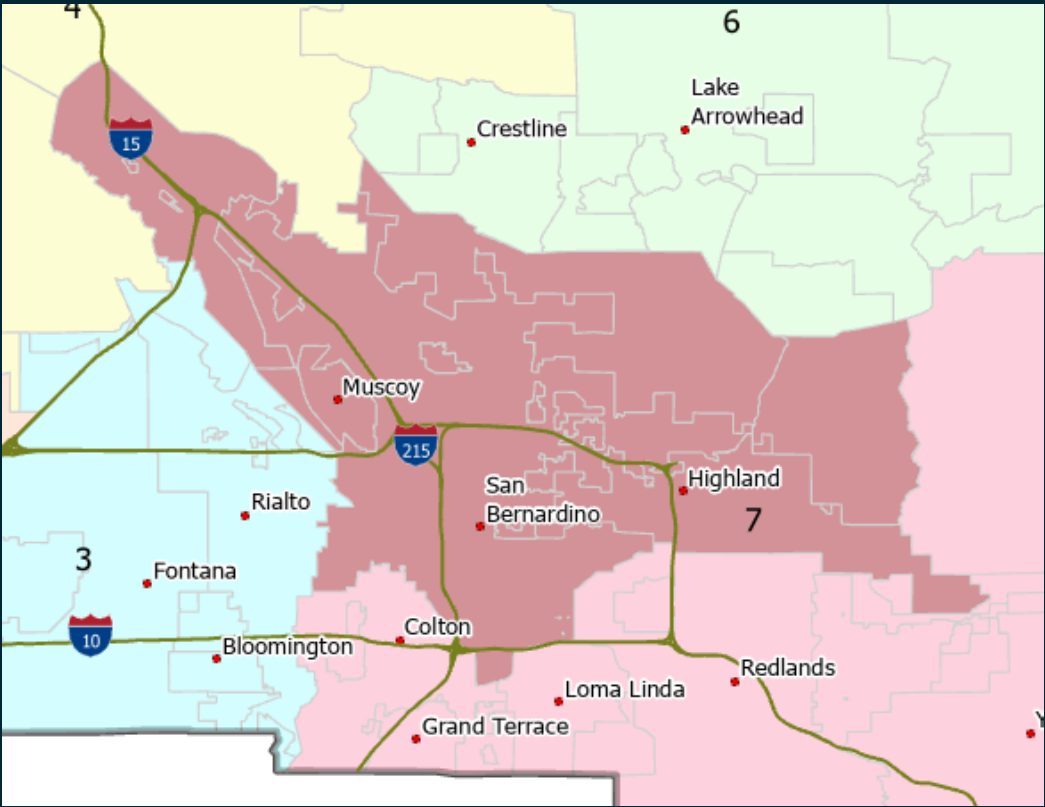

Policy, System, Environmental (PSE) Change

Characteristics of Programs vs PSE Changes

Programs and Events

- Occurs one time
- Additive: can result in short term, individual behavior change
- Focuses on individual behavior
- Not part of an ongoing plan
- Short term
- Non-sustaining

Policy, System, and Environmental Changes

- Ongoing
- Foundational: can shift population behavior and culture over time
- Focuses on population change
- Part of an ongoing plan
- Long term
- Sustaining

Adopted from The Food Trust
